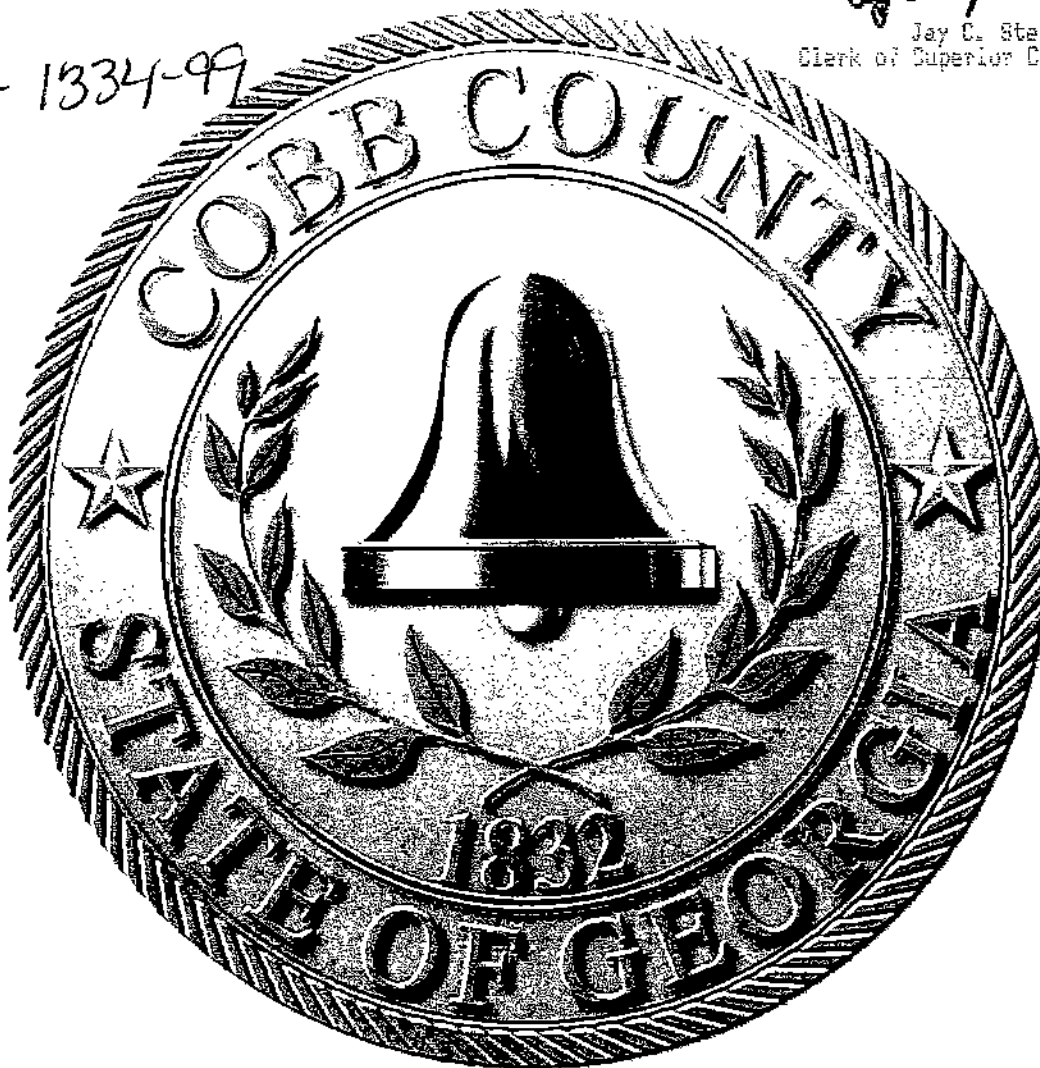

GRAND JURY PRESENTMENTS

We, the Grand Jury, selected and sworn for the March/April 2009 Term, respectfully make the following presentments:

This Grand Jury has acted on **309 Indictments**, returning **302 True Bills** and **7 No Bills** during the term.

COBB COUNTY GRAND JURY REPORTS

Findings from the Inspections of:

Cobb County Adult Detention Center

The March/April Term of the Cobb County Grand Jury visited the Cobb County Adult Detention Center on Tuesday, March 17, 2009. The Grand Jury arrived at 12:30 p.m. and were met by Major Susan Latham and Colonel Lew Alder. They welcomed us with a great lunch. At 1300 hours Sheriff Neil Warren met with us and we were given a PowerPoint presentation and tour of the facility. We were told about the budget of \$64 million, \$20 million for operations and \$44 million to inmate services. At the present time approximately 40,000 inmates are booked-in each year. We also learned that inmates are placed in a classification system, based on history, charges, behavior history and support. The facility is made up of 11 acres and has 1925 beds. The total cost of an inmate is approximately \$44 per day. J-Pod, the older building is still used and can house about 200 inmates and is used for over-flow. The work release program is a success, it was started in 2003 and has about 384 males under sentence with 26 sworn officers and 22 civilians. The females in the work release program are housed in G-Pod in the main jail. The biggest issue facing the jail is that they have around 335 inmates ready for transfer to the State Prison System. Finally, the Detention Center is under going a huge expansion project, funded totally by sales tax (SPLOST), the expansion cost is \$110 million. The Grand Jury would like to thank the Sheriff's Department for their dedication and service to the community.

COBB 911

We the Grand Jury had the opportunity to visit the Cobb County 911 Dispatch Center on March 13, 2009. The information in this report is from a Question/Answer session led by Kathy Strickland of Cobb County 911. The information in an outline format as follows:

- I. The Mission of Cobb County 911 Dispatch

- A. Provide Police/Fire/EMS response to residents of Cobb County
- B. Cobb County 911 is a consolidated Center
 - 1. Multiple agencies from different cities use the Center for the necessary services.
- C. The Center receives calls of an emergency nature as well as non-emergency nature. The Center handles both types in the same manner.
- D. The highest volume of calls comes from residential alarms.
- E. The Center has a language line which provides translations in more than 150 languages.

II. The Nature of Cobb County 911 Dispatch

- A. Dispatchers ask 3 things of every caller
 - 1. Nature of the emergency
 - 2. Location of the emergency
 - 3. Telephone number of the caller

III. The Process of Evaluation of Cobb County 911 Dispatch

- A. Cobb County 911 is accredited by the National Emergency Accreditation Agency.
- B. Quality evaluations are done every month.
 - 1. Five (5) 911 calls are pulled each month and are recorded and evaluated.
 - 2. One hundred (100) calls from the Fire Department/EMS are pulled and evaluated.

IV. Employment with Cobb County 911

- A. Applicants must be 18 years or older
- B. Have a High School Diploma or a GED
- C. Must not have committed a felony
- D. Compensation ranges from \$14.80 to \$15.80 per hour
- E. There is a high rate of turnover in the department
- F. Training is 3 phase:
 - 1. One (1) month class and floor training
 - 2. Certification
 - 3. Side by Side with Training Officer

Summary:

Cobb County 911 strives to provide the citizens of Cobb County with the highest level of emergency services possible. The high rating it has received and continues to receive from the National Emergency Accreditation Agency are an indication of this service. The department maintains a high level of readiness by

hiring the appropriate number of personal and providing them with the needed training to perform their duties in a professional manner.

Marietta-Cobb Youth Detention Center

On March 24, 2009, members of the Grand Jury dropped by for an unscheduled tour of the Youth Detention Center. Supervisor Laticea Butts gave us a tour of the facilities. We toured the recreation area, cafeteria, classrooms, medical facility and intake. The facility was clean, orderly and secure. YDC houses both male and female youth with the capacity of 70 (60 male and 10 female). They can accommodate up to 84 if necessary. They explained that they have a strict schedule and that privileges are earned by a point system. The YDC has two (2) counselors on staff. While the YDC offers discipline, education, recreation and medical care, the Grand Jury noted that no real rehabilitation program is in place except for the incarceration and lack of privileges. We were told that they are on a very tight budget, but community assistance is always welcome, whether it is assistance with a skill building program, helping set up the computer lab or appropriate magazine, videos and hygiene products. These would all need to be cleared through the Supervisor, Mr. Brown.

COBB COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY TRAINING ACADEMY

On March 24, 2009 the March/April 2009 Term Grand Jury had the opportunity to check out the Cobb County Public Safety Training Academy. Grand Jury members had the chance to use the simulators and watch officers engage in hand to hand combat training. We also got an idea of just how much effort goes into training these officers of the law. We learned that officers must participate in 40 hours of training annually and recruits get about 800 hours of training in their first year. The Prism training is the most exciting, it is a large projector and infared camera system that allows officers to practice real life situations in real time. We were told by one of the instructors that Cobb County training involves low shooting rates and high levels of training in learning how to control situations. We the Grand Jury want the people of Cobb County to know we are well protected, thanks to the men and women who put their lives on the line everyday! Thank you, Police and Fire!!

COBB COUNTY WATER SYSTEM COMMITTEE

On March 24, 2009 members of the Grand Jury toured the R.L. Sutton Water Reclamation Facility. The members were greeted by Bob Herbick, Operations Superintendent. The facility is manned by twenty-six (26) employees. The facility has a current permitted capacity of 40 million gallons of wastewater per day, but has the ability to treat up to 120 million gallons per day in an emergency situation. The facility is run on a \$5 million yearly budget.

The R.L. Sutton Water Reclamation Facility conducts its own water testing. Some testing is also done off-site to provide more independent testing. Reports showing the daily performance of the facility are provided to and reviewed by EPD on a monthly basis.

The R. L. Sutton Water Reclamation Facilities water is treated and is 95% clean before it is returned to the Chattahoochee River.

No areas of concern were noticed and all areas were clean and orderly. Based on the observations of the Grand Jury Committee members the facility appears to be managed very efficiently.

COBB COUNTY DRUG TREATMENT COURT COMMITTEE

On March 23, 2009, a committee of Grand Jury members attended a session of Drug Treatment Court, presided over by Judge George Kreeger. The Cobb County Drug Treatment Court program is based on a trial program set-up in 1989 by Janet Reno in Florida. The program allows for attendees to go through a 5 Phase treatment program to get control of their lives and get all the treatment needed to successfully remain in society as a positive contributing member. The program usually takes about 18 months to complete at minimum. Each Phase lasts about 12 weeks, with the exception of Phase I which is 6 weeks and Phases IV and V which are between 22 and 26 weeks. As an alternative to jail stays, it is extremely effective. Jail cost an average of \$43 per day and 70% of this is absorbed by taxpayers. The Drug Treatment Court cost are paid for by the entrants themselves. For the majority, entry into the program requires a felony charge so this is an excellent chance to redeem themselves in-lieu of jail or probation. Entrants are subject to random drug screens 7 days per week throughout the program. An on-site lab is able to get results in as little as 10 minutes. This lab also services the rest of Superior Court testing needs as well. Entrants are gainfully employed and must verify pay stubs and pay Court fees. For outstanding balances over \$100, four hours of community service with pre-approved places is required. Entrants are closely monitored throughout the course and Judge Kreeger takes interest in each person. Each weekly session starts with checks into any personal issues, address changes, special needs or requests and encourages sponsor contact for encouragement. Based on performance, attitude and progress, the person may request a progression to the next phase of the program. For violations or regressions, the person is usually remanded to custody and moved back to a lower phase with more supervision and restrictions. There are about 130 persons in the program right now and it usually is outpatient only. Currently 4 people are in-house due to special needs or circumstances. The program has been extremely successful in rehabilitating offenders. There have been over 200 graduates and there is a 70% graduation rate. Background checks

are done 1 year, 2 years, and 5 years after release from the program and only 10% were re-arrested. The re-arrest includes any offense, not just drug related. Overall, the program appears to be managed very efficiently and is of no cost to the taxpayers, which is an added benefit to the results of those successfully completing the program being able to be re-introduced to normal life in the community. This program is really an asset to the Cobb County Justice System.

COBB COUNTY HUMAN RESOURCES AND SUPERIOR COURT ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

On Tuesday, March 24, 2009 members of the Cobb County Grand Jury met with presenters from Cobb County Human Resources. These employees were Kathleen Daniel, Recruitment Manager and Anita Banks, Employee Relations Specialist, who gave an overview of their department.

Ms. Daniel explained to us that there are 29 employees in the Human Relations Department of Cobb County. She also gave us an overview of what goes on in their department in regards to job announcements, the application process, examinations, the selection process and also the promotional process.

Cobb County uses a merit based system for its employees. Cobb County promotes diversity in all of its departments. Although Cobb County has a hiring freeze in effect at the present time, it did receive 90,000 job applications in 2008.

Ms. Banks covered the county's no harassment and no discrimination policy. She told us that each employee has an orientation that covers harassment and discrimination at the beginning of their employment with the county. The county also has mandatory training of at least 3 hours for every employee annually. There are supervisor development programs and briefings to make sure that each employee is treated fairly. The supervisors also have continuing EEOC training. The Human Resources department does handle complaint investigations and interventions.

Tom Charron, Superior Court Administrator also spoke with us. Mr. Charron gave us an overview of his history with Cobb County which included being the District Attorney for the county in the years 1977-1998. As Court Administrator he works with all 10 Superior Court Judges. The Superior Court handles both civil and criminal cases. The Superior Court oversees cases in divorce, land title, misdemeanors, contract disputes and felonies involving jury trials, of which some may be death penalty cases. In addition to working with the Judges, the Superior Court Administrator, who holds an appointed position, oversees court related functions ranging from the law library to jury administration and interpreters.

Mr. Charron explained some of the other actions that are involved in the Superior Court such as mandated Mediation and Seminar for Divorcing Parents. According to Mr. Charron, Cobb County Superior Court is one of the most innovative courts in the nation with programs that include Alternate Dispute Resolutions to help have a non-adversarial environment for settling disputes. These alternatives also help to keep court costs down.

We did discuss what happens in the offices of the Superior Court Administrator and have been described how his employees interact with the Superior Court Judges. He did explain that there are no longer part-time interns employed in his department as there have been in the past.

We would like to thank Ms. Banks, Ms. Daniel and Mr. Charron for taking the time to help us understand about Cobb County Human Resources and the Office of the Superior Court Administrator and their importance.

COBB COUNTY JUVENILE COURT COMMITTEE

On March 31, 2009 members of the March/April 2009 term of the Grand Jury went to Juvenile Court for a visit.

We were able to sit in on some reunification cases that were presided by Judge A. Gregory Poole. Reunification is very important to all parties involved and is always the plan so parents can be reunited with their children. The courts require that the parents follow a road map to success such as parenting skills, a stable job, housing, substance abuse treatment, etc.

Following the cases, we had a question and answer session with the other programs that deal with the families and juveniles in Cobb County. We spoke to Terry Ford, the Probation Supervisor for the Gang Suppression Program. This is a very strict program in which the parent and juvenile have to sign contracts that they will go to schools and teach other kids about gang signs and what to do if they see them in their school.

We also spoke with Mrs. Lina Maxwell, who oversees C.A.S.A. (Court Appointed Special Advocates). C.A.S.A. helps abused and/or neglected children find safe homes where they can feel safe and get better. There are not enough volunteers to help, so they are always looking for more people, their website to volunteer is www.metrocasa.org. She also spoke to us about the Judicial Citizen Review Panel. This panel meets with all parties involved in a deprivation case to discuss the progress made on the case plan. They discuss how the children are doing, how the parents are, and what DFACS is doing in the situation and if there are any changes needed. The panel reports its findings and any recommendations to the Judge. The judge takes the recommendations and findings very seriously. We

spoke to Judge Juanita Stedman who presides over the Juvenile Drug Treatment Program. This is a very strict program that has seen positive results. We also talked about the Family Dependency Treatment Program where the parents have lost custody of their children, but the courts will work with them through treatments, counseling, and monitoring by the Judge. Some facts about this program since 2006 are:

1. There have been 8 drug-free babies born since the program started.
2. There are 57 people in the treatment program, 6 are men.
3. The waiting list is approximately 3-4 months.

The last program we talked about was the Intensive Supervision Program. This program is finished in 10 months, but sometimes can last longer. There are 5 levels to the program, all levels include: individual and weekly group therapy, mandatory house arrest for the 1st month, curfew times that vary and are set for each level. If the parent or juvenile does not follow the rules they can be charged with a violation of probation, contempt charge or could also be placed in jail.

After speaking with everyone it seems the Juvenile Court system is managed very efficiently and that all of the programs are set to ensure that all parties involved succeed.

COBB COUNTY ANIMAL CONTROL COMMITTEE

On March 24, 2009 the Grand Jury Committee in session selected to visit Cobb County Animal Control where we were greeted and toured the site by Don Bruce. We started the tour in the Intake and Adoption area where the facility takes in and releases into and out of their care by the public. The area was clean and tidy, well-kept. The area where the public comes in to meet the employees is glassed in, but highly visible and friendly. Even though there are Road Officers and Shelter Officers both are interchangeable and often rotated for optimum efficiency. There are 47 staff members that maintain the daily duties that operate this Division of Public Safety, which seems a little light for the size of the facility and the day-to-day operations, but in that they run a very productive and thorough service 24/7 365 days a year.

In the manner of care for all the animals that come through their doors, which includes stray cats and dogs, they also take in large animals like horses, cows, ducks, chickens, and exotics as well as general feral animals, which are segregated, including a barn and pasture on site. A Veterinarian visits twice a week, which is outside sourced to administer vaccines and medical exams to all incomings, and the ones that are sick or feral are quarantined to designated areas to keep the general population of animals healthy. Also, animals who are/were involved in bites and or scratches are quarantined as well until the Vet has cleared them of infectious diseases. All animals that come in are micro-chipped and/or

screened for a micro-chip to help locate lost animals and re-captured animals so that they don't get treated again for same shots. All puppies brought in are Parvo tested as well. As far as the food and waste is concerned the food is strictly kept standard so that all the dogs and cats are fed the same for digestive health. Finally, the matter of removal of the waste of the animals are contained and sent to the compost site.

The Animal Shelter does have a policy in which all animals stay as long as possible except for feral cats and wild animals.

Volunteers are used to help in the day to day tasks, walking, cleaning of pens and bays, feeding and affection is both great for the animals and the volunteers who give their time because of their love of animals. On the day of our visit they were only at 80% capacity and the adoption rate is holding around 67-71%. To help these numbers the volunteers do help out with adoption days through local business and private foster care facilities.

Overall, the committee seemed very pleased with the day-to-day operations, conditions, health and welfare of the employees, volunteers and of course our friends in-need the animals of this facility. Thank you very much for your time and sincere gratitude for your services from all of us animal lovers.

The members of this task force go by the acronym C.A.G.E.(Cobb Anti Gang Enforcement). This group works in the unincorporated Cobb area. Local agencies handle gang activity in their respective areas. The team consists of 1 Sgt. and 7 Investigators.

A gang is considered such when an organized group commits a criminal activity. A large number of gangs exist and almost every school in Cobb County has gang issues. Gang members are men and women and ages range from approximately 12 -24 years of age for most gangs in Cobb County. Some identifying characteristics of the gangs are color of clothing, hand signs, hair cuts, eye brow markings, and tattoos.

The CAGE Unit gives presentations to teachers and administrators to help identify and deal with gangs. Parents are the first line of defense, the CAGE

representatives both noted a number of ways parents can help with the gang problems. These included:

- 1) Be a positive role model
- 2) Get kids involved in organized activities
- 3) Praise kids for good work
- 4) Get to know your child's friends and the parents of those kids
- 5) Don't respect your child's privacy, get involved and find out what they are "into"
- 6) Bottom line, get to know your kids and what they are doing!!
